Sara Ma, an IBD Nurse has been successful in her submission to National Institute for Health Research. The grant titled Developing an intervention to help nurses improve the assessment and care of the sexual health needs of men with Inflammatory Bowel Disease (MenSHIBD): a mixed methods study using co-production will work with academics at University of York to co-produce a prototype intervention to help nurses improve the assessment and care of the sexual health needs of men with IBD.

Bex Blakey, Research and Development Community Engagement Officer working jointly with the Trust and SeeCHANGE, a National Lottery funded project in Scarborough, has been successful in her application to Humber and North Yorkshire Health Fellowship Programme 2024.
